STRENGTHENING OF AYUSHMAN AROGYA MANDIRS

***185 SMT. MALVIKA DEVI:
SHRI NALIN SOREN:**

Will the **MINISTER OF HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE** be pleased to state:

- (a) the number of Ayushman Arogya Mandirs approved and operational across the country, State/UT-wise, district-wise and parliamentary constituency-wise for Nabarangpur, Bastar and Kanker;
- (b) the details of funds allocated, released and utilised for establishment, upgradation and functioning of Ayushman Arogya Mandirs, in the country during the last three years, State-wise and district-wise including the said constituencies;
- (c) whether the Government proposes to further strengthen Ayushman Arogya Mandirs by ensuring and increasing the specialized medical services, essential drugs, modern medical equipments, digital health services, human resources, particularly in aspirational districts, rural, tribal-dominated areas and underserved regions of the country, particularly under the special provisions of the Union Budget 2026-27; and
- (d) if so, the details thereof including the proposed establishment of new AAMs, augmentation of manpower, diagnostic equipments, telemedicine facilities, essential medicines, digital health infrastructure and financial assistance for improving accessibility and effectiveness of primary health services in the country, State/UT-wise?

**STATEMENT REFERRED TO IN REPLY TO LOK SABHA
STARRED QUESTION NO. 185* FOR 31TH JULY, 2026**

(a) to (d) As reported by States/Union Territories (UTs) on Ayushman Arogya Mandir (AAM) portal, 1,86,298 AAMs have been operationalized across the country, as on 30.06.2026. State/ Union Territory-wise number of AAMs operationalized across the country is enclosed as **Annexure-I**.

As informed by Government of Odisha, a total of 213 AAMs have been operationalised in Nabarangpur parliamentary constituency. As informed by Government of Chhattisgarh, a total of 682 AAMs and 645 AAMs have been operationalised in Bastar and Kanker parliamentary constituency respectively.

The National Health Mission (NHM) provides support for improvement in health infrastructure, human resources in health facilities, availability and accessibility to quality healthcare across the country. Technical and financial support is provided to the States/Union Territories to strengthen the public healthcare system, based on the proposals received in the form of Programme Implementation Plans (PIPs) under NHM. Approval is accorded to the proposals in the form of Record of Proceedings (RoPs) as per norms & available resources. Details of State/Union Territory-wise Central Release & Expenditure under NHM including AAMs for the FY 2023-24 to FY 2025-26 is attached at **Annexure-II**.

Under the Pradhan Mantri Ayushman Bharat Health Infrastructure Mission (PM-ABHIM), support is also provided for infrastructure development for 11,001 Building less-AAMs and 5,456 Urban AAMs etc. The Fifteenth Finance Commission (FC-XV) had recommended grants through Local Governments for specific components of the health sectors. Under FC-XV support was provided for 9,863 urban AAMs towards strengthening of primary health care.

The AAMs are required to deliver 12 packages of primary health care services across urban, rural, tribal dominated and aspirational district areas, encompassing Reproductive and Child Care Services, Communicable Diseases, Non Communicable Diseases, Palliative Care and Elderly Care, Care for Common Mental Disorders, Substance Use Disorders Management, Oral Health, ENT Care and Basic Emergency Care.

To complement the expanded services, the essential list of drugs & diagnostics has been expanded to make available 179 drugs & 63 diagnostics at Primary Health Centre (PHC)-AAMs and 113 drugs & 14 diagnostics at Sub Health Centre (SHC)-AAMs in the country.

Under NHM, financial assistance is provided for augmentation of human resources, including Community Health Officer (CHO), Auxiliary Nurse Midwife (ANM) and Multipurpose worker -Male along with ASHAs in the catchment area for SHC-AAM and Medical Officer, staff nurses, pharmacist, Health Assistants and Lab technician for PHC-AAM.

Comprehensive Primary Health Care (CPHC) services at AAM are supported by a set of

interoperable digital portals for digital recording and reporting. In an effort to establish seamless data flow and continuity of care, this Ministry has launched Swasth Bharat Portal - a centralized digital platform that provides single-window access to multiple national health programs, thereby reducing the burden of data reporting on healthcare providers and prioritizing patient care.

Further, the medicine availability has been strengthened through Drugs and Vaccine Distribution Management System (DVDMS) portal to enable end-to-end digital inventory management, real-time stock monitoring, and streamlined supply chain oversight to minimise stock-outs.

As per AAM portal, a total of 31,347 AAMs in tribal districts and 27,775 AAMs in aspirational districts have also been operationalised across the country as on 30.6.2026.

The teleconsultation services, available at all operational AAMs across the country, enables people to access the specialist services closer to their homes addressing concerns of physical accessibility, shortage of service providers and to facilitate continuum of care.

A total of 1,546 Mobile Medical Units (MMUs) are supported under NHM to provide outreach services in remote villages with difficult terrain which are underserved and inaccessible. Under National Ambulance Service, Advanced Life Support (ALS), Basic Life Support (BLS), Patient Transport Vehicle (PTV), Boat ambulances, Bike ambulances and Emergency Response Vehicles are supported under NHM for transportation of patients across the country.
