A Nation's Tribute to the Magic of Indian Cinema

National Film Awards — At a Glance



The National Film Awards are the country's most prestigious honours for excellence in the field of cinema. **Instituted in 1954**, they are conferred every year by the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting. Over seven decades, the awards have recognised outstanding creative and technical achievement in Indian filmmaking. They cover three fields, namely feature films, non-feature films and writing on cinema.

The **72nd National Film Awards** honour achievements in Indian cinema for the year 2024. The winners were announced on **18 July 2026** by the chairpersons of the three juries. The **President of India** will present the awards on **22 September 2026** at **Ekta Nagar (formerly Kevadia), in Gujarat**.

The awards reflect the rich linguistic, cultural and regional diversity of filmmaking across the country. They place large commercial productions and small independent films on a single national platform. This breadth is what gives the honour its standing among filmmakers and audiences alike.

Did You Know?

In a major policy initiative, the Ministry has decided to hold the awards in various parts of the country. Future editions will travel beyond the National Capital to different States and cities. The ceremony at Ekta Nagar will bring together cinematic talent from across India. It will embody the spirit of **Ek Bharat, Shreshtha Bharat**.

Legacy & Evolution — Since 1954

The journey of Indian cinema began in 1913 with Dadasaheb Phalke's film **Raja Harishchandra**. The Film Enquiry Committee, set up in 1949, recommended the institution of the 'State Awards for Films'. They were constituted to honor and encourage the artistic and technical excellence in Indian cinema. The awards were established in 1954 and the first edition honoured the films of 1953.

The first edition of National Film Awards

The first edition covered three categories, namely feature films, documentary films and children's films. **Shyamchi Aai** in Marathi won the President's Gold Medal for the Best All-India Feature Film. **Mahabalipuram** won the President's Gold Medal for the Best Documentary Film, and **Do Bigha Zamin** received a Certificate of Merit. A modest beginning of seven honours thus opened seven decades of national recognition for Indian cinema.

Widening the canvas

Awards for artists and technicians were separately established for the films of the year 1967. Uttam Kumar and Nargis received the first Best Actor and Best Actress awards in 1968. The Best Actor award was then called **Bharat** and the Best Actress award **Urvashi**. The **Dadasaheb Phalke Award** was instituted in 1969 and first presented to Devika Rani. New categories and technical crafts were added steadily as Indian cinema grew in range.

Purpose & Significance

The objectives of the National Film Awards are set out clearly in the official regulations. They encourage the production of films of aesthetic and technical excellence and social relevance. They help audiences understand and appreciate the cultures of different regions of the country. In doing so, the awards also promote the unity and integrity of the nation.

The awards further encourage the study and appreciation of cinema as an art form. Books, articles and reviews carry critical appreciation of this art form to a wider readership.

Why the recognition matters

A National Award confirms that a film has met the highest standard set by the nation. It draws audiences towards work that might otherwise reach only a small circle of viewers. The honour travels with the filmmaker and opens doors for the next project.

Award Structure

The National Film Awards are organised in three sections, along with one lifetime honour. The **Feature Film** section is for full length films. The **Non-Feature Film** section for documentaries, short films, animation and other allied forms. The **Best Writing on Cinema** section honours the best book and the best film critic. The **Dadasaheb Phalke Award** stands apart as the highest honour in Indian cinema.

The feature film section includes Best Feature Film, Best Direction and Best Actor in a Leading Role among others. It also covers Best Children's Film, Best Cinematography, Best Music Direction and Best Costume Design. The non-feature section includes Best Documentary, Best Short Film and Best Animation Film. It also carries Best Arts and Culture Film, Best Narration or Voice Over and Best Script among others.

Every Language Has a Place

A Best Feature Film award is given in each language listed in Schedule VIII of the Constitution. Films in languages outside the Schedule are honoured through separate awards of their own. In the 72nd edition, **Dholi** in Garhwali and **IMBU** in Tulu were recognised under this provision.



How the Awards Are Selected

Entries are invited every year for films certified during the preceding calendar year. The Ministry then constitutes separate juries for each of the three award sections. Distinguished contributors are drawn from the field of cinema, allied forms of art and the humanities to serve as the jury members.

A two-tier examination for feature films

Feature films are assessed through a two-tier process introduced from the 57th edition onwards. Five regional panels first shortlist the entries received from every part of the country. A central panel then decides the winners in the feature film section of the awards. The Non-Feature Film section and the Best Writing on Cinema section have their own juries. No entries are invited for the Dadasaheb Phalke Award, which follows a different route. A specially constituted committee of eminent film personalities recommends the recipient.

The juries of the 72nd edition

Shri Jayaraj chaired the Feature Film Jury for the 72nd National Film Awards. **Shri Aseem Sinha** chaired the Non-Feature Film Jury for the same edition. **Shri A. Chandrasekhar** chaired the Best Writing on Cinema Jury.

Eligibility in Brief

Films must be certified by the CBFC during the award year and must carry English subtitles. A feature film must run for more than 72 minutes. Dubbed, remade or re-edited versions already submitted are not eligible.

Recognition Across Indian Cinema

The National Film Awards look at cinema made in every part of the country. The 72nd edition honoured films in Marathi, Santhali, Tamil, Malayalam, Telugu and Kannada. Films in Tulu and Garhwali were also recognised, among several other languages. For the first time, a **Santhali film** was honoured in the Non-Feature Film section.

Angen, directed by Shri Ravi Raj Murmu, won the Best Debut Film of a Director. A first recognition of this kind widens the map of Indian cinema a little further.

Latest Edition — Key Highlights

The 72nd National Film Awards cover Indian films certified during the year 2024. **Article 370** won the award for Best Feature Film in this edition. Yami Gautam won Best Actress in a Leading Role for the same film. Mammootty and Kartik Aaryan shared the award for Best Actor in a Leading Role. They won the award for **Bramayugam** and **Chandu Champion** respectively.

Shri Rajkumar Periasamy won the award for Best Direction for the Tamil film **Amaran**. **Kalki 2898 AD** was named Best Popular Film Providing Wholesome Entertainment. Shri Randeep Hooda won the Best Debut Film of a Director award for **Swatantrya Veer Savarkar**. **Bhangaar** was adjudged Best Non-Feature Film and **Ram-Nami** was named the Best Documentary.

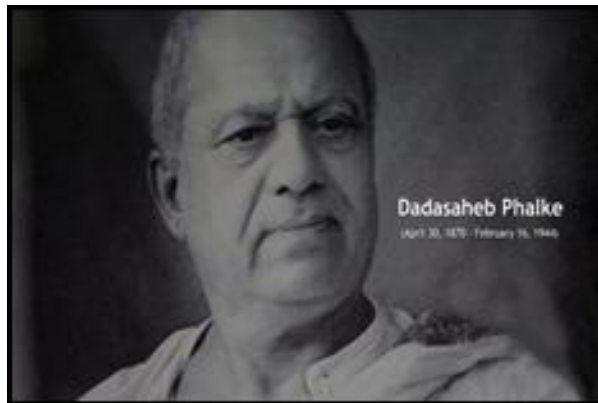

Dadasaheb Phalke Award

The Dadasaheb Phalke Award is the highest honour in the field of Indian cinema. It was instituted in 1969, when it was presented to Devika Rani. The award commemorates Dadasaheb Phalke, who directed **Raja Harishchandra** in the year 1913. Recipients are recognised for outstanding contribution to the growth and development of Indian cinema.

Did You Know?



Dhundiraj Govind Phalke (1870-1944), known as Dadasaheb Phalke, directed *Raja Harishchandra* in 1913, India's first full-length feature film, and went on to make 94 features and 27 short films. Honoured as the **Father of Indian Cinema**, he is commemorated through the Dadasaheb Phalke Award, instituted by the Government of India in 1969.

Dadasaheb Phalke Award 2024

The Dadasaheb Phalke Award for 2024 will be conferred on **Shri Anant Nag**. The Government of India announced the decision on 16 September 2026. He was born on 4 September 1948 in Karnataka and began acting in the early seventies. He made his acting debut in the Kannada feature film **Sankalp**, and his Hindi debut with **Ankur**.

He has portrayed diverse characters in over 300 films across six Indian languages. His work also includes the widely loved television series **Malgudi Days**. He has won five Filmfare Awards and five Karnataka State Best Actor Awards. The Government of India honoured him with the **Padma Bhushan in 2025**. His cinematic journey spans more than five decades and has inspired generations of artists.

Recent Recipients

Shri Mohanlal received the Dadasaheb Phalke Award for the year 2023. Shri Mithun Chakraborty received the award for the year 2022. Smt. Waheeda Rehman received the award for the year 2021. Each award is presented at the National Film Awards ceremony of that edition.

Indian Cinema: Culture, Identity and Influence

Cinema remains one of India's most expressive art forms and one of its most powerful cultural assets. The Ministry of Information and Broadcasting describes it as a powerful medium for creativity, culture and innovation. Beyond artistic expression, it sustains a vast creative economy: India's media and entertainment sector is now the world's fifth largest, supported by 2 to 2.5 million digital creators and a 40 to 60 percent cost advantage in animation and VFX services. Indian films also carry the country's soft power to global audiences, strengthening cultural heritage while creating livelihoods across languages and regions.

Continuing Contribution to Indian Cinema

Indian cinema today reaches audiences in more languages and formats than ever before. The National Film Awards remain the country's central measure of cinematic merit. They reward craft, courage and clarity of vision rather than commercial scale alone.

The move to Ekta Nagar carries the awards closer to audiences outside the capital. Future editions will travel to different states and cities across the country. Film cultures that grow far from the large studios will now find a national stage.

The 72nd edition already shows this promise at work in more than one way. A Santhali film enters the roll of honour for the very first time. A veteran of Kannada cinema receives the highest honour in the field. The awards thus continue to serve both the art and the nation.

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
